

WE ARE ALL Evangelizers

(and whatever else is on Deacon Eric's mind)

Shaking off the dust

Last Sunday, we saw Jesus leaving his hometown of Nazareth after his teachings were rejected by those whom one might assume would be his biggest "fans." The last line of last week's gospel stated that Jesus "was amazed at their lack of faith." In essence, he was dusting off his sandals in defiance of those of would not accept his teachings. And not surprisingly, that's exactly what he tells his disciples to do in today's gospel if they are rejected by those who would not accept their teachings. Just "dust off your sandals in testimony against them," Jesus said.

But unlike last week, when the focus was on the rejection of "the Word," today the rejection is a matter of time management. Jesus was telling his disciples that there were many people who would listen to their preaching of the gospel, so instead of trying to force people to listen when they were determined not to was a poor use of time. In essence, Jesus was telling them to keep moving. Our gospel ended on a positive note as the disciples came back invigorated, having returned after driving out many demons, as well as anointing and, in God's name, curing many who were sick.

The gospel message over the past two weeks is pretty loud and clear for us -- we must all persist in our evangelization efforts. Sometimes we will run into brick walls as Jesus did in his hometown and we will be frustrated as well as disappointed at people's lack of faith. Sometimes we will run into opposition as the disciples did, but we need to figuratively kick off the dust from our sandals and move on. Eventually, as the disciples found out, there will be successes. The episode in the TV series "The Chosen" did a wonderful iob in showing how each successful encounter for the apostles overcame many dead-ends.

This doesn't mean we all need to knock on all our neighbors' doors as the apostles did, but it does mean we have to live our Catholicism with joy and vitality and to be ready for any opportunity to share our beliefs. In the words of St. Peter (1Pt 3:15): "Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope." In order to do that we have to know our faith. Studies have found that the biggest obstacle Catholics have in evangelizing is knowing our faith well enough to defend it to a Protestant.

One way to learn is to better understand the bible. To do that one can listen to Fr. Michael Schmitz's podcast "The Bible in a Year." Another way is to take the Catholic Biblical School's 4-year in depth study of Scripture. Several parishioners have already taken it and a new class will begin at Most Holy Trinity in Fowler this fall (more on that at a later date). Or attend parishhosted events as we had last spring - a presentation by a Catholic historian, a night where the St. Joe clergy answered questions of faith from parishioners, and of course our three-day mission on the Eucharist. Information on how parishioners can help determine what adult faith opportunities we present is also coming soon.) Let's learn and live our faith better.


St. Joseph Catholic School St Johns, MI **Teaching Position**


What to do with your old and unwanted Religious items

A sacramental is a sacred sign that bears resemblance to the sacraments. Sacramentals include religious articles such as scapulars, blessed holy cards, crucifixes, statues, Bibles, missals, Lectionaries, holy water and oils, liturgical vestments, and altar cloths. But what are you to do with them when they break, become tattered and worn out? You can't just discard them. They're almost like people, sacred. They need to be treated properly, even at the end.

The basic rule for the disposal of these items is to burn or to bury them. During the 1800s the Church issued several decisions concerning this issue. Here are a few examples: A chalice which becomes "unserviceable" is not to be sold but must be used for some other sacred purpose or melted. Vestments, altar cloths, and linens must be destroyed. Polluted or excess holy water must

be poured into the ground. Palms are to be burned, and the ashes then used for distribution on Ash Wednesday or returned to the ground. A broken rosary or religious statue normally would be buried. In all, the underlying idea is that when something has been dedicated to God should be returned to God. Never should one just "throw out" what has been blessed and dedicated to God.

With the exception of rosaries which can be placed on the rosary rack, please do not bring your unwanted items to the parish nor leave them in the back of the church. I understand the idea of leaving those things for someone else to pick up and use. However, that is not happening, and items just continue to pile up. After a while this becomes a problem because it makes the church look un-kept. If you don't have a fire pit to burn the items or have a yard in which to bury them, then ask a neighbor or relative if they can help you dispose of those items. This is precisely what we do with items that are left in the church.



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
